## Expected impact and sustainability will be achieved

# What impact/intended impact/sustainability are you expecting?

- Increased confidence level of those delivering the PE curriculum specifically in Dance and Swimming
- Increase in the number of children meeting the National Curriculum expectations for swimming
- Increased confidence level evident in observations, drop ins and pupil voice in engaging all learners in physical activity and providing appropriate adaptations during lessons that engage all learners and provide opportunities for them to progress appropriately
- For more children to access Extra Curricular clubs
- For more children to transition to clubs provided in the local community
- Increased opportunities for all groups of children to take part in competitive sport
- Range of extra curricular clubs increases

# How will you know? What **evidence** do you have or expect to have?

- Evidence from lesson observations, drop ins and pupil voice
- Data collection for swimming and other PE assessments
- Increased engagement and positive pupil voice outcomes regarding PE and physical activity
- Data collection regarding club participation, broken down into vulnerable groups and target groups, PP, SEND and females
- Data in conjunction with local clubs about participation on a regular basis and at one off, specific events this may take some time to filter through
- Increase in the number of children who have represented the school at a sporting competition or internally in House sports competitions





## Actual impact/sustainability and supporting evidence

### What impact/sustainability have you seen?

- Children have taken part in dance competitions and workshops and a number of older children have hosted dance clubs for younger children supported by adults.
- Booster swimming clubs run by school staff have been well attended and there has been an increase in the children leaving school having achieved the National curriculum outcomes for swimming.
- Staff consider adapting lessons and larger events to enable access and success for all, for example sports day offered competition but also a range of races based on different skills from speed, to balance to agility enabling all groups of children to take part and engage positively.
- A girls football club was successfully run and a girls only football league was entered, several of the girls attend the local football club sessions. There is regularly a mix of girls and boys playing football together on the playground.
- Children regularly attending Sensory Circuits in the mornings before school
  and benefitting from a positive and calm start to the day ready for learning,
  staff have received further training and confidently provide a safe and secure
  environment for this to take place

### What evidence do you have?

- Club participation data indicates that children have hosted, cricket, dance (x
   3), drama and football clubs for younger children
- % of children achieving the outcomes for swimming is at 90% in Year 6 with all children demonstrating water confidence and a full understanding of water safety
- All children took part in Sports Day and the field and marathon events to represent their House and contribute to Team points
- All pupil premium children have accessed an extra curricular club data from registers and club sign ups
- Participation and enthusiasm for some clubs remains high for example Country Dancing club – 42 children attended and took part in the Country Dancing Festival
- Sensory circuit register and SNAPS indicate increased regular participation in Sensory circuits
- Pupil voice conducted indicates that some children have an increased awareness of the variety of sports available locally and have expressed interest in participating in clubs outside of school
- Microsoft Forms data indicates a higher engagement from parents in extra curricular clubs information and uptake for children
